
Florence (Firenze):

Sicily:

Best Time to Visit

Winter (November to March): Italy's off-season. It's a good time to explore cities without the crowds, and if you enjoy skiing, the Alps and Dolomites are ideal winter destinations.







10 Day Sample Itinerary of Italy



Arrive in Naples & Transfer to Sorrento Morning: Arrive in Naples. If time allows, explore Naples briefly by visiting the Spaccanapoli district or enjoying a true Neapolitan pizza.

Afternoon: Transfer to Sorrento (1-hour drive/train). Check into your hotel and take some time to stroll around the historic center of Sorrento, famous for its coastal views and lemon groves.

Evening: Enjoy dinner overlooking the Bay of Naples with a view of Mount Vesuvius.



Day Trip to Capri

Morning: Take a ferry from Sorrento to Capri (about 30 minutes).

Visit the Blue Grotto (weather permitting) and explore the island's luxurious Piazzetta. Take the chairlift to Monte Solaro for breathtaking views.

Afternoon: Stroll through the Gardens of Augustus and walk along the Via Krupp path for stunning views of the cliffs and Faraglioni rock formations.

Evening: Return to Sorrento for dinner in a local trattoria.



Sorrento to Amalfi Coast – Positano & Amalfi

Morning: Check out from Sorrento and drive or take a bus to Positano (40-minute drive). Spend the morning exploring Positano's charming streets, boutique shops, and beaches like Spiaggia Grande. Afternoon: Continue to Amalfi (30 minutes from Positano). Visit the Amalfi Cathedral and explore the historic center. Enjoy a leisurely walk along the marina.

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Evening: Check into your hotel in Amalfi or
Ravello and enjoy a seafood dinner
overlooking the Mediterranean.



Amalfi Coast – Ravello & Path of the Gods Morning: Visit Ravello, a quieter hilltop town known for its stunning villas and gardens. Explore Villa Cimbrone and Villa Rufolo, offering panoramic views of the coastline.

Afternoon: If you're up for a hike, take the Path of the Gods (Sentiero degli Dei), which offers some of the best views of the Amalfi Coast. The trail runs from Bomerano to Nocelle near Positano. Evening: Return to your hotel for a relaxing dinner.



Amalfi to Matera

Morning: Check out and head to Matera in Basilicata (about 3.5-hour drive).
Afternoon: Arrive in Matera, one of the world's oldest continuously inhabited cities and a UNESCO World Heritage site. Check into a Sassi (cave hotel) for a unique experience.

Explore the ancient cave dwellings (Sassi di Matera) and visit sites like Casa Grotta and San Pietro Caveoso.

Evening: Enjoy dinner in one of Matera's cave restaurants.



Matera to Alberobello & Ostuni (Puglia)
Morning: Drive to Alberobello (1-hour drive) to
see the famous trulli houses, the white, coneroofed structures that are unique to this area.
Stroll through Rione Monti and learn about
the history of these distinctive buildings.
Afternoon: Continue to Ostuni, the "White City"
of Puglia (1-hour drive). Walk through its
picturesque old town, and explore its
whitewashed houses, narrow streets, and
views over the olive groves. Evening: Stay
overnight in Ostuni or a nearby masseria (a
traditional farmhouse) and enjoy a farm-totable dinner featuring local produce and




Polignano a Mare & Monopoli Morning: Drive to Polignano a Mare (30 minutes from Ostuni). This coastal town is famous for its dramatic cliffs, crystal-clear water, and Lama Monachile beach. Take a walk along the cliffs and enjoy a coffee at a café with sea views.

Afternoon: Visit Monopoli, a nearby seaside town with a lovely historic center. Wander through its narrow streets, and visit Monopoli Cathedral and the port area. Evening: Return to your accommodation in Ostuni or Polignano a Mare.



Lecce – The Florence of the South Morning: Head to Lecce, the heart of the Salento region (1.5-hour drive). Known as the "Florence of the South," Lecce is famous for its Baroque architecture. Visit Piazza del Duomo, Basilica di Santa Croce, and the Roman Amphitheatre. Afternoon: Explore the city's artisanal shops and enjoy some pasticciotto (a local pastry) and caffè leccese (iced coffee with almond milk). Evening: Stay overnight in Lecce and enjoy a dinner of local dishes like



Gallipoli – Coastal Puglia Morning: Drive to Gallipoli, a charming fishing town on the Ionian coast (40 minutes from Lecce). Visit the Castello di Gallipoli and the old town, which is located on a small island.

Afternoon: Relax on one of Gallipoli's beaches like Baia Verde or take a boat trip around the coast.

Evening: Return to Lecce or stay overnight in Gallipoli and enjoy a seafood feast at a seaside restaurant.



Lecce to Bari – Departure
Morning: Drive to Bari (about 1.5-hour
drive), the capital of Puglia, where you
can explore the historic old town, Basilica
di San Nicola, and the seafront
promenade.
