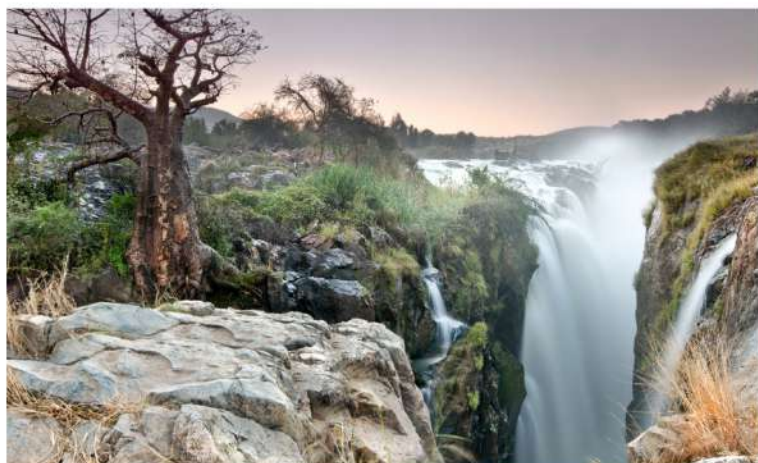
8. Coastal Towns

2. Wet Season (November to April)

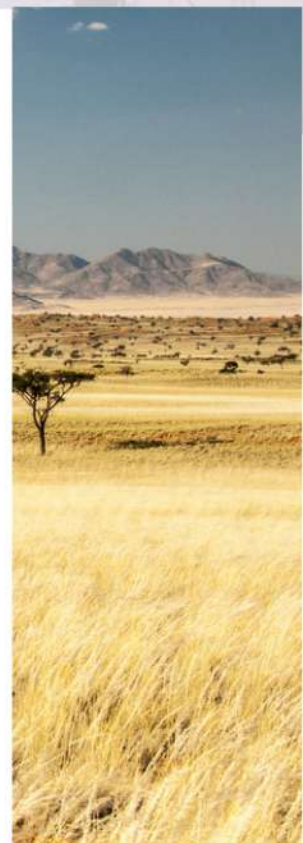
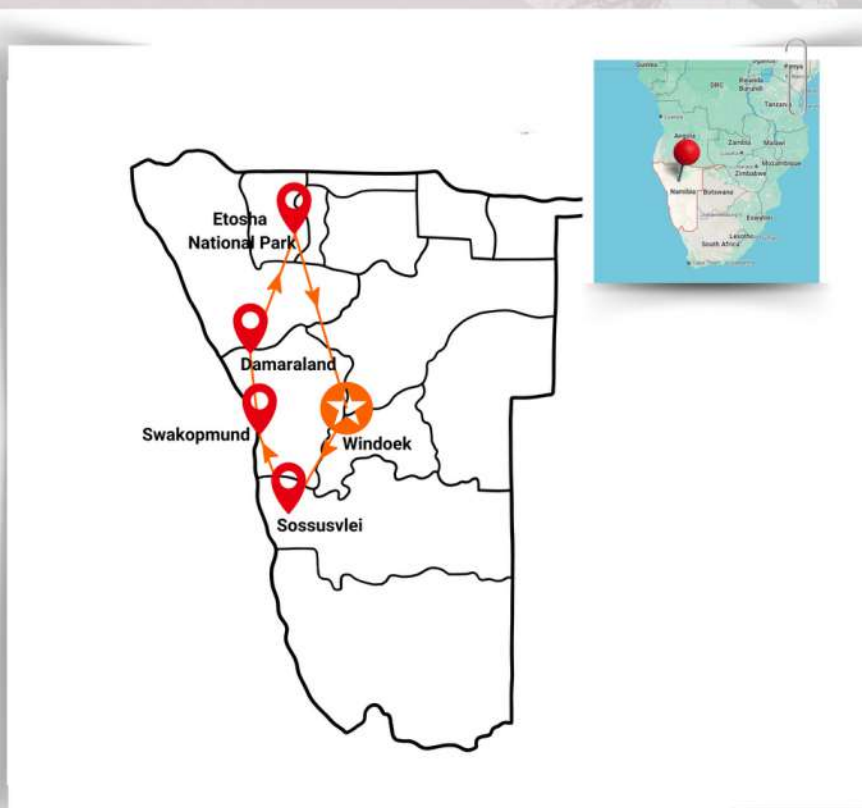

Weather: Expect warmer temperatures and increased humidity. Rainfall varies by region, with the northern areas receiving more rain than the south. Daytime temperatures typically range from 25°C to 35°C (77°F to 95°F).

Overall Recommendation:

For Wildlife Safaris: May to October is generally the best time to visit Namibia for wildlife viewing, with the dry season offering the clearest conditions and highest chances of spotting animals.

For Scenic Beauty and Bird Watching: November to April provides a different experience, with lush landscapes and vibrant birdlife, though the wet season's occasional rain can affect travel plans.

Day 1



Arrival in Windhoek

Day 4



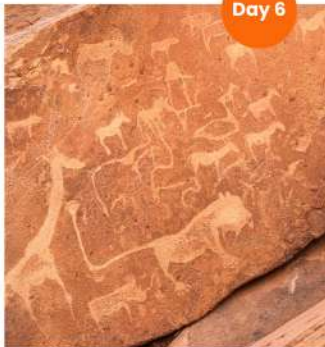
Sossusvlei to Swakopmund
Drive to Swakopmund: Head towards the coast, passing through the Namib-Naukluft National Park and crossing the Tropic of Capricorn.
Welwitschia Drive: Optionally, take a detour to see the ancient Welwitschia plants and Moon Landscape before arriving in Swakopmund.
Overnight: Swakopmund.

Day 5



Swakopmund
Explore Swakopmund: Enjoy the mix of adventure and relaxation in this charming coastal town. Activities include sandboarding, quad biking in the dunes, or exploring the town's German colonial architecture.
Cape Cross Seal Reserve: If time allows, take a day trip to Cape Cross to see the massive seal colony.
Overnight: Swakopmund.

Day 6



Swakopmund to Damaraland
Drive to Damaraland: Depart Swakopmund and drive towards Damaraland, a region known for its stunning landscapes and desert-adapted wildlife.
Twyfelfontein: Visit Twyfelfontein, a UNESCO World Heritage site with ancient rock engravings, the Organ Pipes, and the Petrified Forest.
Overnight: Damaraland.

Day 8



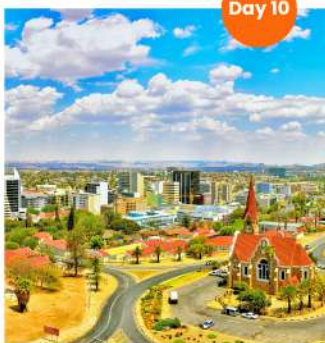
Etosha National Park
